## Our Presenters



**Peter D. Waite, MPH, DDS, MD**

**Professor and McCallum Chair of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery**

**Department of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery, The University of Alabama School of Dentistry  
Birmingham, AL**

Dr. Waite is professor and McCallum Chair of the Department of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery at the University of Alabama. He received his DDS degree from the University of Minnesota School of Dentistry and his medical degree from the University of Alabama School of Medicine. Peter is a member of the American Medical Association, American Dental Association, American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, American Academy of Cosmetic Surgery, and the American Sleep Disorders Association.

He has clinical expertise in impacted teeth, orthognathic surgery, craniofacial, cleft lip/palate, facial reconstruction, cosmetic surgery, obstructive sleep apnea and dental implants. Peter is an internationally recognized lecturer, past president of the AACCS, and editor of *Peterson's Principles of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery*. He has given many lectures around the world and published numerous articles and book chapters. Peter claims his greatest accomplishment and pleasure to be the education and training of residents and students by demonstrating state-of-the-art surgical techniques. He performs all surgery under the watchful eye and assisting hand of advance trained residents. He enjoys a busy and diverse oral and maxillofacial surgery practice at The Kirklin Clinic. It is a beautifully designed multi-specialty clinic with easy patient access.

### **Surgical Outcomes for Suture-Less: Surgery in 366 Impacted Third Molar Patients**

The purpose of this study is to identify surgical outcomes in the third molar surgery when no sutures are used for primary closure. A total of 1,280 third molars were removed from 366 patients in an outpatient setting using intravenous sedation and local anesthesia. A small V-shaped flap was raised in all cases and no sutures were placed over a 2-year period (2001-2003). All people were contacted by a registered nurse within 24 hours. All records were reviewed by a medical investigator and IRB approval was obtained. The mean age was 22.14 years, males 39%, females 61%, white 75%, African American 22%, and Asian 3%. Ninety-three people of 366 experienced at least one complaint. Alveolar osteitis was 2.81% for the total teeth extracted and 10.7% for the mandibular Class IV impactions. A total of 652 mandibular third molars were removed (Class III, n= 113; Class IV, n= 522). Forty-eight of 366 patients (13.1%) had postoperative diagnosis of alveolar osteitis. Small flap third molar surgery without sutures is less invasive and saves time. Delayed healing in oral surgery is not new. The outcome of 1,280 extractions demonstrates good results.

### **Surgical Management of Obstructive Sleep Apnea: Changing the Upper Airway**

The pathophysiology of obstructive sleep apnea is poorly defined, but in most patients it is thought to be related to maximal relaxation of the upper airway during rapid eye movement sleep. The patient commonly complains of daytime fatigue or sleepiness; restless, poor quality sleep at night; loud obnoxious snoring; sudden arousal and gasping for breath during sleep; and morning headache. As a result of this, plus frequent obesity, these patients are at great risk for myocardial infarction and early death. A complete work-up includes a polysomnogram, nasopharyngoscopy, cephalometric analysis, and a helical computed tomographic (CT) scan to evaluate the upper airway. Maxillomandibular advancement surgery pulls the tongue base forward and is considered a highly successful operation, with a cure rate of about 85%. Air flow through the upper airway is inversely proportional to the resistance. Therefore, surgical techniques to decrease the resistance and open the upper airway are also a key area for research. Computer fluid dynamics and bioengineering lend themselves to analysis of air flow. Pre- and postoperative CT scans can be digitized and mesh-generated data created. Perhaps in the future a CT scan could be obtained before surgery and manipulated in such a way as to allow the surgeon to accurately determine the millimeters of advancement needed for a specific cure.

Dr. Louis obtained his BS degree, cum laude from the University of Southwestern Louisiana, his DDS degree from Louisiana State University and his MD degree from the University of Alabama School of Medicine. Louis's research has focused around reducing alveolar bone loss in patients with periodontal disease. His recent study has focused on autogenous bone graft versus bank

bone retained with titanium mesh. He has published in many referred journals including: *International Journal of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery*, *Seminars in Orthodontics*, *American Journal of Cosmetic Surgery*, *Journal of the American Dental Association* and the *Journal of Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery*.

### **Titanium Mesh Versus Cranial Bone Graft**

The use of titanium mesh as a containment system in bone grafting is one of many techniques that can be used to reconstruct the atrophic alveolar ridge and segmented defects. Calvarial bone grafts can also be utilized for ridge reconstruction. This lecture will present clinical experiences with the use of titanium mesh in alveolar ridge reconstruction and compare this to the use of calvarial bone in various applications prior to implant placement. The advantages and disadvantages of these techniques will be discussed with special emphasis on pearls and pitfalls. Objectives: 1) Describe the indications for the use of titanium mesh with bone grafting vs. calvarial bone grafting prior to implant placement. 2) Describe the surgical technique of the use of titanium mesh in alveolar ridge bone grafting techniques and methods that can be employed to minimize the risk of wound dehiscence and/or graft loss. 3) Describe the surgical technique for the harvest and successful reconstruction of the atrophic alveolar ridge.

### **TMJ: Is There Any Evidence?**

Surgical management of temporomandibular joint disorders continues to be challenging. The management is often biased based on the interest of the surgeon and also his/her understanding of the disease. This surgical course will look into the various treatment options in management of TMJ disorders with particular emphasis on evidence based approach. The course will also review the outcomes of a wide variety of surgical procedures ranging from arthrocentesis to alloplastic total joint prosthesis. Objectives: 1) Provide the clinician with an evidenced based knowledge for the surgical management of TMJ disorders. 2) Identify surgical procedures that improve the outcomes of patients requiring TMJ surgery.

Maxillofacial Surgery Society. David is actively involved in student and resident education both didactically and clinically.

### **Socket Grafting and Beyond**

The purpose of this lecture will be to discuss the indications and techniques for socket conversion therapy following tooth extraction. This procedure assists in preparing the edentulous site for dental implant placement. Bone grafting fresh extraction sites slows the natural loss of alveolar bone while awaiting implant placement.

Originally from Toledo, OH, Dr. Zouhary earned his BS degree from Calvin College in Grand Rapids, MI. After earning a doctor of dental surgery DDS degree and graduating with distinction from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, Kenneth served an oral and maxillofacial surgery residency at UAB. He graduated from the University of Alabama School of Medicine. During his residency, he served as delegate to the

Resident Section of the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery as well as delegate to the UAB House Staff Council. Among his many academic and leadership awards, Kenneth was the recipient of the Alpha Omega Scholarship Award, the Straumann Resident Research Scholarship, and the Windent Resident Scholarship. He was also inducted into the Omicron Kappa Upsilon Honor Society. To date, Kenneth has been published in the *Journal of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery* and *Oral Surgery, Oral Medicine, Oral Pathology, Oral Radiology & Endodontics*.

### **Bone Graft Harvesting From Distant Site: Concepts & Techniques**

Bony augmentation of the moderately to severely resorbed alveolus in preparation for endosseous dental implant placement can be quite challenging for the oral and maxillofacial surgeon. Autogenous bone remains the 'gold standard' for alveolar grafting. Multiple extra-oral bone graft sources can be utilized to help meet this challenge including the iliac crest, proximal tibia, and calvarium. The aim of this lecture is to review the anatomy, harvest techniques and morbidity associated with each of these donor sites.

## Randy Malloy to be Honored Posthumously with SSOMS Distinguished Educator Award

Former LSU educator Dr. Randy Malloy will be honored at our annual meeting with our Distinguished Educator Award. The award was established in 2005. The recipient of this award must be a current or former member of SSOMS and a distinguished educator in the southeastern region for over fifteen years. Randy died unexpectedly in 2008 at the age of 62.

Dr. Malloy attended the University of Iowa and University of Iowa College of Dentistry where he received his DDS with honors. Dr. Malloy then pursued a research path at LSU Medical Center in New Orleans, Louisiana and received his a PhD in Anatomy. He went on to serve in the United States

Air Force at Wilford Hall USAF Base in San Antonio, Texas. After the Air Force

he returned to LSU Medical Center in New Orleans as an assistant professor in the cell biology and anatomy department and completed his residency in oral and maxillofacial surgery at the LSU School of Dentistry/Charity Hospital New Orleans. Upon completion, he entered private practice in Lafayette, Louisiana, and maintained part-time appointments in cell biology and anatomy as well as oral surgery at the LSU Medical Center, LSU School of Dentistry and Charity Hospital in New Orleans.

In 2003, Dr. Malloy returned to LSU Health Sciences Center (LSUHSC)/Charity Hospital as associate professor and head of the department of dentistry at MCLNO; with appointments in the departments of cell biology and anatomy and oral and maxillofacial surgery in the LSU Schools of Dentistry and Medicine. Throughout his career Dr. Malloy accomplished several research projects and was the research mentor to numerous residents in various dental specialties. He was a diplomate of the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons and the National Dental Board of Anesthesiology. He has been a member of several local, state, regional, and national committees associated with the American Dental Association and the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons (AAOMS). He served as Chairman of the Committee on Residency Education and Training for the AAOMS.

In 2005 and 2006, he was honored by the AAOMS with the Distinguished Service Award. Dr. Malloy was appointed by the Dean of the LSU School of Dentistry (LSUSD) as project director to rebuild the "Interim" LSU Dental School in Baton Rouge, Louisiana and tasked with rebuilding the school and clinics in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina. Under his guidance the Baton Rouge school opened in three months and the New Orleans facilities as early as September 2007. That same year, he was promoted to Assistant Dean for Advanced Education and Hospitals at LSUSD.
